Artistic Anatomy: The Art Of Drawing The Human Form

The Millicent Rogers Museum in conjunction with the Taos Arts Club / Teen Art Studio presents "Artistic Anatomy: The Art of Drawing The Human Form", a teen art exhibition encompassing a collection of drawings inspired by the human form. The teen artists included in this exhibition are from the Taos community.

The human figure is one of the most enduring themes in the history of fine art and accurately depicting the human form is arguably the most difficult task an artist will encounter. Throughout history, artists have devoted vast amounts of time to the study of the human form and figure drawing has long been held as the foundation for this practice.
